Strengthen the BES policy-science-practice network around the IPBES assessment and NEA themes through **Dialogues**

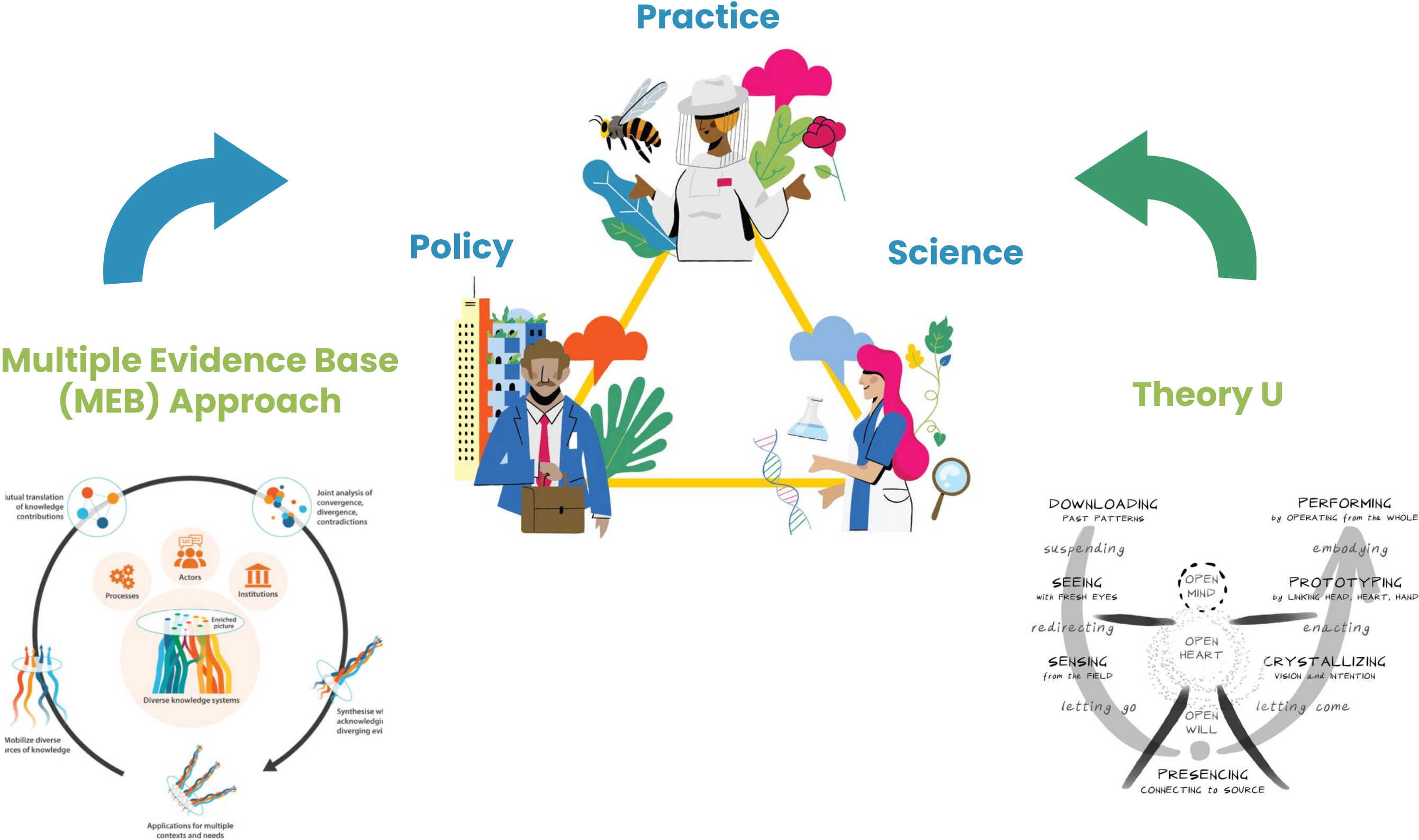

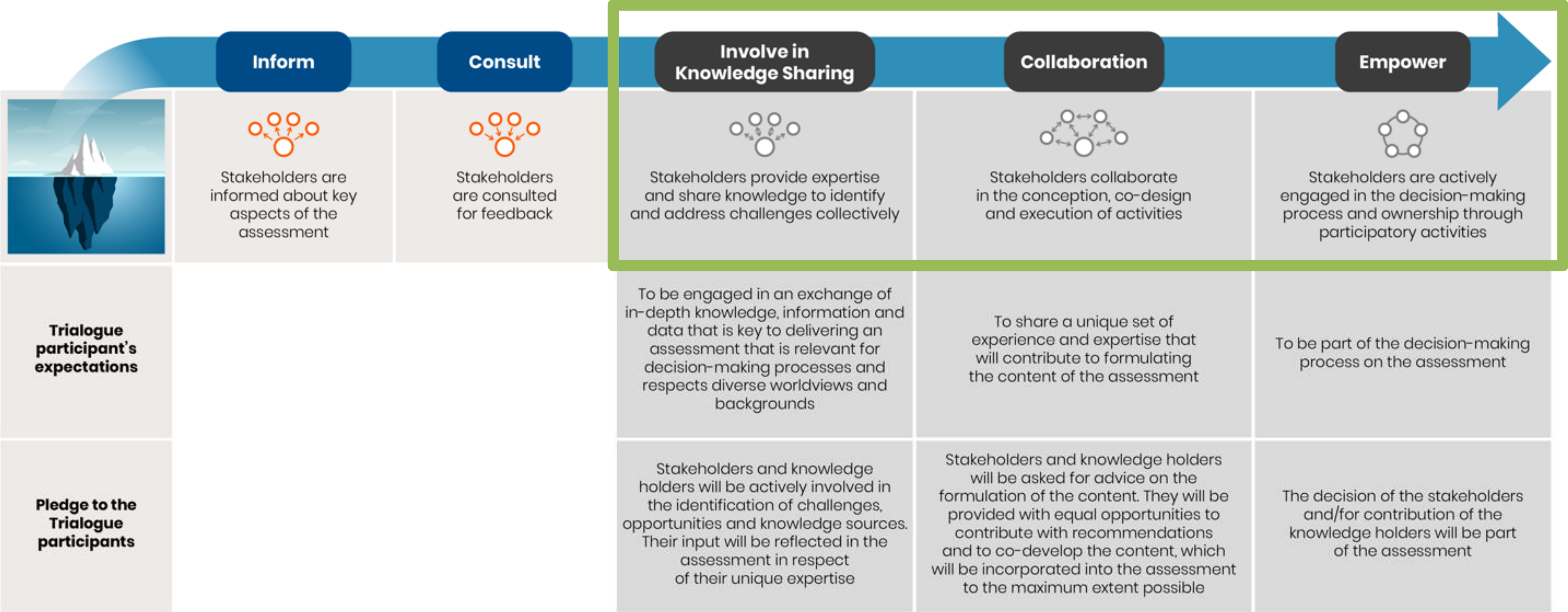

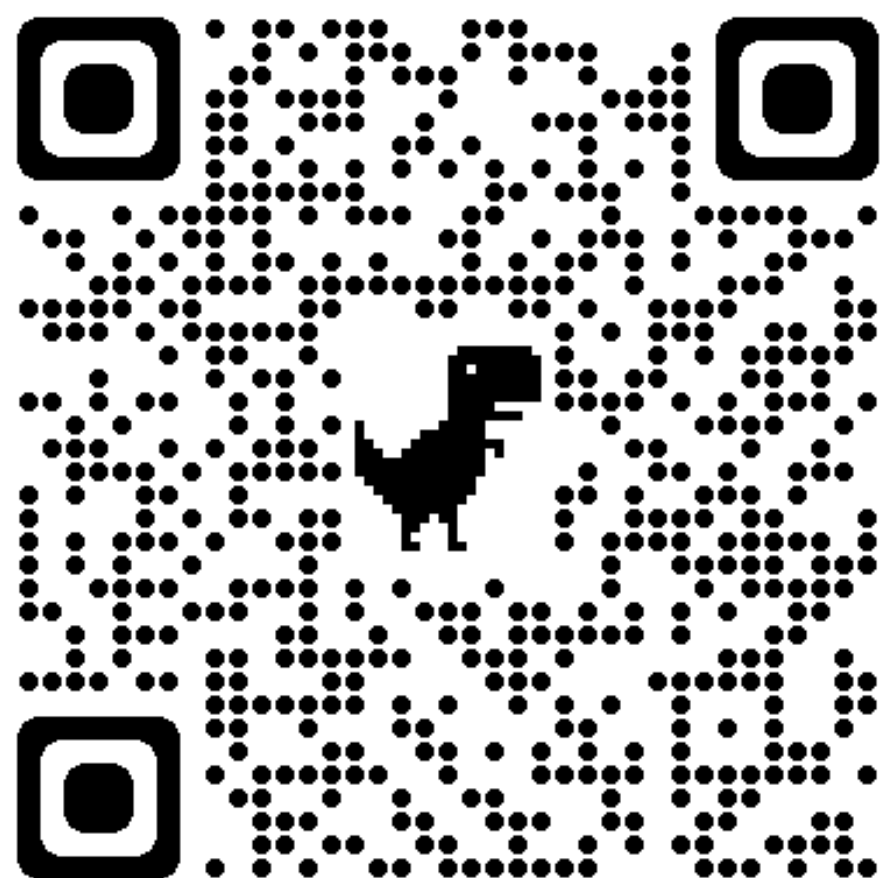
